MEETING SUMMARY

Tuesday, February 21, 2023

Part 1 - Presentation: Emergency Preparedness & Response by SD41's Health and Safety Manager, Terry Gomez

Levels of Responsibility

- Family and Resident Responsibility: evacuation plan for family: how to proceed, contact plan -out-of-area contact (to connect the family members), and phone tree.
- School, PAC, and Community Responsibility: drills, site plan knowledge (according to school location). Identified
 people for special assignments. First aid team (before first responders arrive), Student Release Plan practice
 needed, start working out the mechanics.
- District Responsibility: Policy 3.35 Practices for emergency drills. At least six evacuation drills involving a fire, earthquake, or environmental emergency, lockdown drill... In collaboration with RCMP, Fire, Ambulance and Municipal Services: earthquake: infrastructure fire, gas leak, flood or collapse. Ongoing risk assessment.
- If the school needs any of the items on the following list, the administrator needs to contact healthandsafety@burnabyschools.ca Terry Gomez, and request the items.
- Municipal, Provincial, Federal Responsibility: -Burnaby Emergency Operations Centre (RCMP, Fire, Ambulance, Search and Rescue), Emergency Social Services Plan (emergency shelter for families, vouchers for meals, transportation and clothing), Reception Centres (in the past, secondary schools, now Cameron – and another school, Government Services, Salvation Army, SPCA, Communications for updates and reunions, First Aid and Medical).
- May be provided by PAC: Emergency Kiosk: Principal needs to contact the Maintenance Services Centre (Facilities Manager) to check where to set up. PAC funding.
- Not clear from the District the means of communication during emergencies, left to school discretion?

Q&A

- Some schools were seismically upgraded, all schools should have the emergency plan and practice.
- The Ministry states that the District needs to step up and guide the emergency kit. Administrator is the key person
 elaborating it with the District. Parents suggested the District takes care of more from the kit and guides schools if
 needed.

Part 2 - Presentation: Pre-Budget by Deputy Secretary-Treasurer, Ishver Khunguray

Current Year Budget – 2022/23 Amended Operating Budget

- Three years projection. Every March before Spring break will be released next week.
- February 28: Board Approval of Amended budget.
- April 11, 2023: Partner Groups, DPAC/ April 12, 2023: Public Budget Presentation / April 18, 2023: Partner Groups input on the budget.
- Staffing and other things need to be checked.
- September: count of all the students, goes to Ministry. Amended Budget February 2023.
- June: books closed, September: presented to Board.

Current Picture

- Significant enrolment growth this year. 6% a big change compared to other years: 24,924 students in 2022/23 (ELL: approx. 6,700, diverse abilities: approx. 1,300). Provincial government gives funding for refugees.
- Higher replacement costs due to staff absences.
- Inflationary cost pressures (Provincial Government pays for salaries renegotiations).
- Facility capacity challenges in schools leading to infrastructure costs.

Part 3 - DPAC News

DPAC Update

- Alfred Romann, treasurer: passwords have been updated. Two pilot programs providing technology to students (laptops) in Mountain and Alpha Secondary. The program will expand to other schools.
- Jen Mezei: Technology Plan: every student has the same access to technology throughout the District, it has been budgeted for.
- April 11, pre-pre-budget consultation, at Burnaby Central.


Miscellanea

- Burnaby South PAC Learning together series Managing Social Media April 24th it might be possible to attend for parents with kids from grades 4 to 7, they will inform soon.
- Lock down responsibility: do not text your kids. Ashley DPAC chair shares: one kid texted a parent and everybody
 was very worried, everybody trying to get kids out. Information into misinformation. Be careful, wait for the
 Administrator to inform in case of a lockdown. For their safety, no telephone use during the lockdowns. Parents
 ask the District to take the lead and send a message on how to proceed. In May there will be a meeting with
 information, and a form.

- Batteries (2 D cell) with expiry date
 Clipboard/pencil/emergency procedures
 Crowbars recovery tools
 Dust masks x 30
 First Aid Kit (small)
 Flashlight x 1
 Garbage bags x 30
 Gloves
 Safety vest
 Toilet paper
 Whistle

- There is a 10% off if you tell Canadian Tire or any store (?) that the purchase is for the emergency kit.
- They followed the categories mentioned below and organized the supplies and equipment into garbage cans with
 posters with indicators: comfort, communications, first aid and first responders, incident command, recovery and
 rescue. They created an inventory list and teachers' backpacks with all the necessary supplies. Donation of five
 dollars per student to resupply for the earthquake bin per year.
